Who we are

Established in 1987, the Sex Education Forum is a group of partners working together to achieve quality relationships and sex education (RSE) for all children and young people.

We built the consensus of support for statutory RSE and are trusted by schools, the media, government and researchers as the leading authority on RSE.

Our work on RSE is underpinned by evidence, a rights-based approach and the expressed needs of children and young people.

We became a registered charity in April 2021, No 1193467 with governance provided by our trustees.







Since 1987, we have

Spoken as a group of partner organisations held together by shared values and principles.

Collected and disseminated evidence, including from young people, parents and teachers, and via Select Committee enquiries.

Disseminated good practice in teaching RSE, tackling challenging issues and supporting educators.

Linked closely with government officials and Ministers, with a seat at the table as DfE policy developed over 3 decades.

Used the press to shift public opinion and challenge misinformation.

Influenced parliamentarians and policy-makers and secured legislative change.

Our objectives

RSE is now statutory, but there is still much to do to ensure all children & young people receive quality RSE

Objective one

Ensuring children and young people's right to RSE is firmly embedded into national and local government policies and is understood and supported by the public and professionals.

Objective two

Supporting professionals to be well informed and competent to commission, plan, teach, evaluate and research RSE in partnership with parents, carers and children and young people.

Objective three

To identify, explore and respond to new themes and at times challenging issues emerging in practice, policy and research, nationally and internationally and particularly in relation to children and young people most at risk of missing out on RSE and of poor sexual health and relationships outcomes.

Partnership and collaboration is integral to achieving our objectives

The Sex Education Forum is the only national partnership of organisations dedicated to RSE policy, practice and evidence.

Our partners include VCSOs, local authorities and commercial organisations. They span family, faith, education, health, disability, advocacy and research organisations, with a mix of RSE specialists and broader focus on children and young people's wellbeing.

Applications from partners are reviewed to ensure values, including evidence-based approach, are aligned.

For each of 22 topic areas, 1,000 16-17 year olds were asked this question in relation to what they learned at school and from their parents/carers (home). The response choices were 'yes', 'no' or 'I didn't learn about this at all'.



Immediate priorities for the Sex Education Forum Board of Trustees
